We had 23 licensed area Ham's and several non-licensed guests reporting to the Ames Nowell State Park in Abington, MA. to set up portable antennas, radios, generators and tents. The Field Day 2004 team set up 4 HF Base Stations along with a 6 Meter Base Station and a 2 Meter Base Station and made 264 contacts with 37 States, 4 Canadian Provinces and 1 contact with the Virgin Islands in the Caribbean.

In July, the Fox Hunters were active as usual and some members participated in local Community Emergency Response Training (CERT). Other members provided communication support for a YMCA Triathlon in Middleboro, participated with the Museum Ship's Special Event onboard the USS Salem in Quincy and helped out with the Great Mass. Several members are actively participating in planning sessions and will finish the month providing communication support as part of the Amateur Radio Emergency Service (ARES) team during the Democratic National Convention. 


NEW MEMBERS




SCHOLARSHIP RECIPIENT

FOX HUNTING - EVERY SATURDAY - 10 AM TO NOON



Shown In the photo taken July 3rd is **George Davis KC1FZ** and **Roy Logan KB1CYV** seen to the left of **Gil Follett W1GMF** who was the Fox and is still seated in his foxmobile with **Loren Pimentel N1IQI** and **Bruce Hayden NI1X** seen to the right. The Fox was hiding just off Rt 106 on Main Street in Plympton under a high voltage power line. **Loren N1IQI** was the first to find the Fox while **The Bruce NI1X** spent 2 hours chasing what was probably reflections off the power lines.

The Fox Hunt takes place every Saturday morning between 10 am and noon. The fox transmits for 30 seconds

every 5 minutes on 146.565 MHz. The Fox Hunters coordinate their efforts on the Bridgewater repeater 147.180 MHz. Listen in and report if you can or cannot hear the Fox from your location. **Bob Johnson K1VU** usually gives a beam heading from his home QTH in West Bridgewater. You never know - the Fox could be hiding in your back yard some weekend.

Whitman Amateur Radio Public Service NET (WARPSN): Walter Dolson K1BZD is our traffic manager and has been instrumental in teaching NET Control and traffic handling to the members of the Whitman Amateur Radio Club by promoting the WARPSN. This NET meets every Sunday morning at 8:30 A.M. on the Whitman REPEATER 147.225 MHz. Come join in and share your amateur radio related activities with the other area HAMs and short-wave listeners as well. In June we had four sessions with an average of 13 area HAMs checking in each week and 8 messages were sent.



MIDDLEBORO YMCA TRIATHLON

FIELD DAY 2004 - AMES NOWELL STATE PARK - ABINGTON, MA

First came the Saturday morning antenna crew. **Dave Gurney WA1YZH** is shown using a string, with a weight tied on to one end, that he twirls round and round and then lets the weight sail up over the tree branches. **Dave WA1YZH** reports that he uses this method on camping trips.

complete with fishing line and florescent orange weights. **Bill N1FRE** installed his all band off center fed dipole up between 40 and 50 feet in the air by putting the line over the top of the tallest pine trees. The height of this antenna was an impressive sight.

Jeff Lehmann N1ZZN brought a 2 meter vertical and hung it from a tree branch with a sky hook. A rope was tossed over a high branch and attached to the top of the vertical antenna. **Jeff N1ZZN** is shown just before the antenna was pulled up into the tree and left dangling about 25 feet in the air. A great example of a Field Day weekend installation.

Rob Macedo KD1CY and the SKYWARN crew kept the local Field Day 2004 crews appraised of the storm cells in the area and one passed right over the Field Day site at 6 pm giving us a brief downpour that accompanied a cool front and a nice breeze.

Jim Wolf N1OIU transported both the Club 4000 watt emergency generator (color green) and his own 8000 watt Lincoln Generator / welder (color red) to the Field Day site. The Club members chose to operate on Jim's N1OIU generator which was adjusted to put out a steady 118 volts. The generator was topped off at 8 pm Saturday and ran flawlessly all night, getting 11 hours to a tank full and burning a little over 16 gallons in the 24 hour period.

80 - METER BASE STATION

Bob Sikes W1MMM set up a 6 Meter Base Station using a rotating ¼ wave dipole, made of PVC plastic pipe and lashed to his vehicle rear door tire frame.

Contacts were made with other stations in Eastern Mass. and Rhode Island. **Bob W1MMM** experienced some temporary equipment problems that forced him to quit early but reports he is looking forward to spending more time next year.

20 - METER BASE STATION

Roy Logan KB1CYV brought his Icon 735 transceiver and set up a 20 meter Base Station. The club members helped set up Bill's N1FRE tent and a 40 meter dipole was used for an antenna. Roy KB1CYV also set up a backup 2 meter transceiver in the tent using his Radio Shack handheld and a Radio Shack power amplifier and ran the Saturday night SKYWARN Net from the Field Day site. Jim Kenworthy KB1KFF is shown making a 20 meter contact with Bob Burns K1RB who was mobile at the time.

2 METER BASE STATION

Bruce Hayden NI1X set up a 2 meter Base Station in the Club screen tent using his Icom IC-207 and using **Jeff's N1ZZN** diamond antenna. This was the talk in station and was used to monitor the Whitman Repeater. **Jeff Lehmann N1ZZN** later went on 2 meter simplex 146.52 MHz and made contacts with stations as far away as Boston.

At the July meeting **Jeff N1ZZN** reported on a rare July 5th or 6th Sporadic-E Band opening where he was able to make 2 meter simplex contacts with amateur radio operators in Alabama and Tennessee. Just imagine the contacts that could have been made if this band opening had occurred over the Field Day weekend.

ARRL REPRESENTATIVE VISITS THE FIELD DAY SITE

Jim Duarte N1IV of Plainville – The ARRL Public Information Officer for the Eastern Mass Section stopped by the Whitman Club Field day site as part of his Field Day weekend tour. He was introduced to **Jeff N1SOM** who had volunteered to make up the log books and dupe sheets and volunteered to submit the Whitman Club Field day 2004 results to the ARRL.

Jim N1IV and **The Bruce NI1X** discussed the new classification "F" Field Day sites that are being operated out of local Emergency Operation Centers. In all only 14 category "F" Field Day Stations were contacted by the Whitman Club this year. We also discussed the fact that should a local or regional

emergency occur, the national Homeland Security policy of shelter in place would see HAMs operating from their homes or from their local City or Town Emergency Operations Center where their Field Day experience would be put to good use repairing damaged antennas and setting up emergency power generators and that's what Field Day is all about.

AMATEUR RADIO EMERGENCY SERVICE (ARES) VOLUNTEERS NEEDED FOR DEMOCRATIC NATIONAL CONVENTION (DNC)

Whitman Club members **Bruce Hayden NI1X**, **Roy Logan KB1CYV**, **Bob Burns K1RB** and **George Davis KC1FZ** attended an ARES planning session on July 17th at the Bridgewater Emergency Operations Center where requirements for communication support for the DNC continue to be developed. The American Red Cross chapters in Boston and Waltham have requested amateur radio support and team support for the Salvation Army will be mobilized as required.

A Net Control Command Center will be set up to support this activity utilizing the town of Bridgewater Emergency Operations Center (EOC). Area HAM **Carl Aveni N1FY**, the newly named ARES District Emergency Coordinator for Plymouth County, will be coordinating the NET Control activities at the Bridgewater EOC. The coverage will be Monday through Friday - 8 am till midnight. We all hope this turns out to be nothing but a great training exercise. The crew expects to fine-tune net control skills with regular call-ups of NETs every few hours and the origination and passing of routine National Traffic System (NTS) status traffic messages.

The ARES representatives are also looking for a large number of "stand-by" operators that will be ready to provide additional support should an incident occur. This support will range from maintaining NET watches at home and passing status traffic messages directing mobilization to actual deployment to designated emergency shelters in the area. In accordance with the ARES Statement of Understanding (SOU) with the American Red Cross, amateur radio operators would supply communication between emergency shelters, supply vehicles going to and from the emergency shelters and the Red Cross Chapter Houses (Headquarters).

You do not have to be an ARES member to volunteer your amateur radio message handling and NET control skills however those amateur radio operators who have already participated in ARES Emergency Communication Workshops or Community Emergency Response Training know all about the necessary "Go-Kit" and supplies needed for deployment and the proper attitude necessary to fit in and cooperate so that you become part of the solution and not part of the problem. **Carl Aveni N1FY** is usually monitoring the Bridgewater REPEATER 147.180 MHz if want to offer your help or want more info.
