Jim Kenworthy KB1KFF reported that he had help from AI Drollett W1SM in installing a Gap Titan vertical antenna on the rear of his shed. This got Jim KB1KFF <u>"On-The-Air"</u> with his HF equipment. If you look closely, the vertical antenna has four large horizontal elements that just clear the top of the shed roof and has several attached elements that tune to various bands. Jim KB1KFF reports that he made several DX contacts – one to Ireland on the first day of operation. Since then he has made several contacts as far south as Florida and as far west as California with others in Ohio and Texas on the way.



WHITMAN EMERGENCY MANAGEMENT AGENCY RACES TEAM - ON STANDBY FOR BLIZZARD OF 2005

Bob Burns K1RB reported that he received a call from **Robert Schmitt** – Whitman Emergency Management Agency – to inform him that Whitman was planning to open two shelter sites in case they are needed during the Blizzard of 2005. This would require one HAM operator at the Fire Station Emergency Operations Center and one each at the shelters. Both **Bob K1RB** and **Bill Hayden N1FRE** reported to the Fire Station Emergency Operations Center to plan for possible deployment. Hams would be required to bring their own go-kit that includes 2-meter or 440 MHz portable radios and extra batteries. **Bob K1RB** and **Bill N1FRE** were released to standby at home. Transportation could be arranged. **Bob K1RB** is looking for additional HAM volunteers.

WHO SEZ HAMS AREN'T ROMANTIC ?

What a pleasant surprise to see the unique photo of **David Ring N1EA** and wife **Cheryl KB0RQN** that was printed in the newsletter of the FISTS CW Club. In case you are wondering **David's N1EA** wife's name is <u>Cheryl W</u>. Ring **KB0RQN**

The Whitman Club members first met **David N1EA** at the Marshfield Fair Special Event where **David N1EA** gave us a lesson on Morse code. At the Marshfield Fair Morse code could get through where voice could not.

David N1EA has a wonderful story to share one that he will never forget:

"In 1980, while serving on the USA flagged tanker WILLIAMSBURGH, **Jim Pfister NS1L** and myself answered the SOS from the passenger ship PRINSENDAM, a Holand-America cruiser bound for the Orient which was burning out of control south of Valdez, Alaska. In what many called a miraculous rescue, all 535 passengers and crew of the burning passenger liner were rescued from

lifeboats after abandoning ship in the frigid waters of the Gulf of Alaska. The ship's modern highteck satellite communication and the SSB and VHF-FM distress signals failed to summon aid (the three phase ac mains to the Bridge and Radio Room were lost during the fire), but the dependable 500-KHz Morse Code SOS (operating on battery power) was heard by over 350 stations, including the USA supertanker WILLIAMSBURGH.

The Morse code signals were heard throughout the Pacific Ocean – even as far away

as New Zealand. A 35 year veteran at RCA's San Francisco Radio / KPH was kind enough to comment that he had never heard such professional communications in all his years. I am glad that **Jim Pfister NS1L** and myself held up the tradition of our many qualified Radio Officers who have given their skills to save lives at sea. There were over 300 logs kept by these Radio Officers who monitored our communications and stood by to assist us in any way. In 1988 **Jim Pfister NS1L** and I were awarded the "Marconi Gold Medal" for our work during this rescue."
