



Phil McNamara N1XTB volunteered to help man the Brockton office of the Red Cross and was joined by **Nancy KB1OZN**. **Phil N1XTB** brought his "rigs-in-a-box" which contains an Icom 2720, Icom 706, LDG portable tuner, KamXL, RigRunner, Astron power supply, external antenna leads for 6m/HF and VHF/UHF. **Phil N1XTB** also rigged a portable 2-Meter antenna.

Phil N1XTB reported that "The Red Cross has a Yaesu FT-2720 Dual band radio located on the upstairs radio room desk. The communication checks for the drill were done using the Red Cross radio and roof antenna. The Brockton ARC office was able to communicate on 2m simplex with the Town of Bridgewater EOC, Mass Bay Red Cross Cambridge and the State EOC in Framingham". The test showed that 2-Meter simplex messages could be relayed through MEMA Framingham to all Red Cross Headquarters in the greater Boston area.
