Jeff Lehmann N1ZZN volunteered to set up a 20-Meter Base Station using his Kenwood TS-530 transceiver and The Bruce's N11X G5RV dipole antenna. Jeff N1ZZN was using his portable computer and a computer logging program and was promoting the use of computer logging at all Special Events

Contacts were made as far south as Florida and as far West as South Dakota. The 20-Meter Base Station made the most contacts. All contacts were made within a 1200 mile radius of Plymouth, MA.

The crew was heard explaining that the Mayflower II is actually located 3 miles from the Plimoth Plantation on the Plymouth waterfront. The Mayflower II is a re-creation of a late 16th century English merchant ship of the same size as the original Mayflower.

As part of our training, we encourage everyone to practice sending routine RADIOGRAM messages. In November we had 4 sessions with an average of 13 area HAMs checking in each week. A total of 19 messages were sent which included 11 messages sent from the visitors at the Plimoth Plantation to family and friends in California, Florida, Massachusetts, Missouri, and Pennsylvania.

Finally, **The Bruce NI1X** volunteered to be the QSL manager. This involves printing up all the Special Event Certificates and mailing out a Special Event package that consists of a Special Event Certificate and QSL card that confirms the time and date of the contact, a Whitman Club Plimoth Plantation 2007 Special Issue newsletter and a handout from the Plimoth Plantation describing the living museum. A total of 38 QSL card requests had been received in the first two weeks.

Using the Echolink Base Station, **The Bruce NI1X** accessed a Plymouth, England 70cm REPEATER and while talking with **Dave M0TAZ**, who was mobile outside of London, put out several calls for any HAM who could link up Plymouth Massachusetts with Plymouth, England. **Laurie**

Hummerstone M0VRT of Plymouth, England happened to come on the air, mobile, and answered that call. As the say - the rest is history.

Laurie MOVRT soon arrived home and made contact via Echolink direct with Plimoth Plantation where he talked with The Bruce NI1X, Ray KB10DU and Ron N1PXX who happened to be monitoring from home.



It was early afternoon on a brisk fall day at Plymouth Plantation when **Don Burke KB1LXH** and his sons **Noah** 9, and **Riley** 5 left the Hornblower House to travel back in time to 1627 Plimoth Plantation. Before we arrived at the English Village we toured the Craft Center and gift shop and then we began our self guided tour by entering the Western Gate of the 1627 English Village. The boys had to explore the large fort with the cannons upstairs. From here we can see some of outer Plymouth Harbor and parts of Otter River.

Our second stop was the home of Susana Winslow. She was sitting by her hearth engaged in a conversation with visitors. The two room dirt floored house slept 7. We heard her speak about the Pilgrim Bay Company who paid for the settlers to come to "this place". Each of the 150 Villagers agreed to come for 7 years. As of today, Pilgrim Bay Company shows no interest in coming back here so those who remain in the village are trying to buy the Pilgrim Bay Company. It takes thousands of dollars to buy a ship with 7 months of supplies.

Ms. Winslow's neighbor Emily was neatening her house when we arrived. She told us about the usefulness of local birds. A swan's feathers were most desired to be used as mattresses, as are the other water fowl, ducks and the like. The black and white birds that are found down by the ocean are not useful at all, they smell horridly bad! (Seagulls I'm betting)

A DAY AT PLIMOTH PLANTATION By: Don Burke KB1LXH Cont:

We left Emily's home and wandered down the road where a gentleman came up to me and told me about **Tisquantum (Squanto)**. He must have read my cap. He was very thoughtful and sympathetic toward Tisquantum. It seems that **Tisquantum**, a "good man" ,had died only a year ago; "he began to bleed from the nose and just fell to the ground."

Hopkins, spoke to me bluntly and asked why would I want his name on my cap, "I never liked him". Four years earlier a skirmish broke out between the Wampanoag's and the settlers. Two Wampanoag died. **Mr. Hopkins** and his wife **Elizabeth** told us about the villagers receiving an arrow wrapped in snakeskin. **Squanto** told them it was a declaration of war. So afterward the Pilgrims responded with a "bag of black power and shot". They also built the outer fence. There has been no trouble since.

But **Noah** and **Riley** wanted something more; our exploration led us to a man leaning on a fence post near his garden. **Johnson Brewster** was just ending his conversation about how a man "does please his wife when he is dressed in his suit and armor and parades around with other men." The ladies he was speaking to agreed. As they left the guest thanked him by saying "Thank you Sir" **Mr. Brewster** told them that they paid him a higher complement than he deserved. He explained what he meant by this; when two close friends are talking they will use their Christian name like "**Johnson**" with each other. However a man is often called "Mister" with his surname, in general conversation. A man who is married and is seen as being good to his wife is often called "Goodman" or "The Good - Man".

The Good Man **Brewster** also explained how when two men greet each other they would remove their hats, and bow. A man of higher regard in the community would place his hat back on his head first; where the lesser would wait to cover his head.



We left the 1627 village and came back to 2007 to view the Otter River. A short walk leads us up a boardwalk to a sign about the Wampanoag's Homesite. "A single family home of the Hobbamock, a councilman to Ousamequin known as **Massasoit**, a sachem or leader." It is important to note that unlike the 1627 village, there are no characters here. "The People" wear traditional clothing from 1600 made from deerskins and speak in modern English.

We arrived at the homesite to find native people burning out a canoe, being very careful not to burn a hole through the log. It takes about 5 Days to make a boat, if you burn for 24 hours a day.

Close by are two Wetus or house of three fires. We went inside to warm by the fire, sit on deerskin beds and listen to native people tell us about the Wetus. These homes are made from cedar wood an can be as warm as 90*F in winter with little to no smoke. It is common to have three generations living in one Wetus.

Whitman Times Article - "Thanksgiving transmitted all around the world"

Whitman Amateur Radio Club spreads the word

The Whitman Amateur Radio Club carried on the 27-year tradition of transmitting goodwill over the airways from Plimoth Plantation the Saturday and Sunday following Thanksgiving.

Paul Burbine N1VTI, president of the Whitman Club, reported that 31 area amateur radio operators - "HAMs" - set up five portable conventional ham radio stations and antennas including an internet-linked radio station named "Echo Link" at the re-creation of the 17th century Pilgrim settlement and Wompanoag Indian home site. They exchanged contacts with 171 other amateur radio operators in 37 states, 6 foreign countries and 2 Canadian provinces.

The ham operators told the story of Plimoth Plantation over

the airways, explaining about the living museum and how visitors, especially children, were amazed by the actors who, dressed as Pilgrims, were trained to speak in the dialect of the time. They did not acknowledge the existence of any of our modern technical wonders, not even clocks, as they did not exist. The actors more appropriately explained the harsh reality of early Pilgrim life at Plimoth in the New World.

Prior to the event, notice of this year's program was published in the American Radio Relay League's ARRL monthly magazine, which has both national and international distribution. The radio crew found amateur radio operators from all over the world anxious to make contact with Plimoth Plantation.

Of special interest was the halfhour long radio exchange made via Echolink by Bruce Hayden NI1X, Ray Bolduc KB1ODU and Ron Smith N1PXX with Laurie Hummerstone M0VRT of the Plymouth Radio Club in Plymouth England.

Each amateur who contacts the club station, WA1NPO, is entitled to receive a certificate, suitable for framing, which includes a picture of Mayflower II and confirms the date and time of the contact. Shortwave listeners also are eligible for the certificate by contacting the club by mail.

Along with listening to any of the conventional voice stations, children visiting the plantation and stopping by the display were encouraged to send their name in Morse Code with a practice oscillator available. The adults could send radiogram messages free of charge to friends and relatives via amateur radio.


Club members explained that during special events, like this one, amateur radio operators practice sending these routine messages, via radio, to amateur radio operators in local neighborhoods. They, in turn, deliver each message by telephone free of charge.

Club members also explain

how these routine messages quickly could change to priority or emergency messages in times of national emergencies.
