Phil McNamara N1XTB has been appointed the Amateur Radio Emergency Service (ARES) South Shore District Emergency Coordinator replacing area HAM Carl Aveni N1FY who has new duties including ARES Eastern Massachusetts Assistant Section Emergency Coordinator.

Phil N1XTB holds an Extra Class license and lives in Middleboro with his wife **Clare** and his 6 year old son **Philip. Phil N1XTB** runs his own computer business and can usually be found monitoring the Bridgewater 147.180 MHz REPEATER.

Phil N1XTB is a member of several HAM clubs including Whitman and Massasoit and has been deeply involved with Air Force – Military Amateur Radio Service (MARS). **Phil N1XTB** is the ARES / MARS Liaison Emergency Coordinator for the Eastern Massachusetts section of ARES.

Phil N1XTB has been a volunteer for the Bridgewater Emergency Management Agency (EMA) – Radio Amateur Civil Emergency Service (RACES) team for years and recently helped set up a RACES team at the Carver EMA. Phil N1XTB has extensive training in emergency communications. He is also a trained SKYWARN Observer and has been active as a SKYWARN Net Control Operator on the Bridgewater REPEATER and has helped staff the National Weather Taunton HAM desk.

Phil N1XTB operates and maintains a 2-Meter PACKET Bulletin Board for hosting messages and sending messages via the National Traffic System. He also operates and maintains a system on VHF and HF for Air Force MARS as part of the Air Force MARS Winlink 2000/Airmail digital network.

Phil N1XTB has assembled a Go Kit (his radios in a Box) that consists of HF, VHF and UHF transceivers along with a PACKET Terminal Node Controller (TNC) that connects to his portable computer. He has brought his Go Kit, along with a portable solar panel and battery power supply, to the Whitman and other area club meetings, for Show and Tell, while giving presentations on Emergency Power Backup systems and Winlink 2000. His Go Kit has been used at Public Service Events like local road races, the Boston Marathon and the recent Gardner Ice Storm ARES Deployment. Of special interest - **Phil's N1XTB** home radio shack has a solar power system as one of it's power sources.

There is a growing need for Amateur Radio Emergency Service (ARES) backup emergency communication in this area. **Phil N1XTB** was instrumental in designing and debugging the Eastern Massachusetts ARES Data Base that has been offered and accepted by other states as a user-friendly custom designed database.

Phil N1XTB maintains the ARES database that now contains over 400 names of HAMs in the Eastern Massachusetts section who have volunteered to be part of ARES. This is one of the greatest bargains for HAMs who want to QSL with HAMs outside the United States. This service can not be used to exchange QSL cards within the 48 contiguous states.

HAMs keep lines open through the winter

This winter, while New Englanders were busy shoveling and plowers were busy plowing, the Whitman Amateur Radio Club was busy keeping lines of communication open.

"When all else fails, HAMs get through," said club member Paul Moss, a Community Emergency Response Team volunteer for the Whitman Emergency Management Agency.

There are more than 300 countries that license amateur radio operators, or HAMs. All are volunteers and receive no compensation for services when called on to help as Amateur Radio Emergency Service or Radio Amateur Civil Emergency Service operators.

"Morse code is still used and radio-grams are still sent over the air by HAMs all over the world

as a fun part of the hobby, which, during times of emergency, could be turned into priority messages," said Bill Hayden, who has been an amateur radio operator and a member of the Whitman club since 1986. "I was always fascinated by short wave and two-way radio transmissions form all over the world. CB radio offered very little of this and was very limited."

That was when he decided to take the licensing class.

At that time, Morse code proficiency was necessary for the Federal Communications Commission license. That requirement recently was dis-

With his first aid and shelter training, he helped relieve the other operators who were providing backup emergency communication between shelters and the Gardner Emergency Operations Center.

The ice storm disrupted telephone lines from properly coming through to the hospital, city hall and other buildings. Backup amateur radio communication was put into place as one of the operators was used to ensure communications at the hospital.

"I literally felt like a fly on the wall in Gardner," Moss said.

His expertise in amateur radio During a December ice storm wasn't the only skill that was useful. With his background as a retired utility worker, Moss, 62, also was able to help restore power to shelter two, Gardner. Moss, along with oth- located at the Gardner National

"This was an educational experience," he said. "I learned a few lessons on what to do or not do at a shelter concerning shelter operations. I see the benefit when the shelter volunteers have their amateur radio license and can perform a needed service while providing radio support at the same time.

"Once again. HAMs are always ready to lend a helping hand and amateur radio gets through when all else fails. All in all, this was a worthwhile experience, and I would do it all again whenever needed."

In addition to supporting communications from one location to another during dire conditions, the club assists in any way it can. Operators will supply food, beverages and

blankets out of a retired ambulance to rescue groups such as Hanson Fire Department.

"It has been in service for about six months. We hope it will be available to surrounding communities soon," Moss said.

The next closest rehab unit to offer help is in Providence.

"I always had an interest [in this line of work]," Moss said. "I worked during storms, chasing downed wires and tree limbs. When my wife passed away I was given the opportunity to help in a more complete way."


