The temperature was 45 degrees and it was raining when the antenna crew arrived at Plimoth Plantation Friday morning to install antennas. The crew split up into three teams and one crew installed the Club Cushcraft R-6 antenna at the Reception Center. The second crew installed **Paul Burbine's N1VTI** 20-Meter folded dipole and the club's 40-Meter dipole at the Administration Building. The third crew installed the club's "Fritzel" (off center fed Windom) all band dipole antenna at the Hornblower House along with the club's all band HF OUTBACKER vertical antenna on the portable stand and **Paul Moss's KB1MTW** 2-Meter vertical antenna

Prior to the event **Paul Burbine N1VTI** had secured permission to hold the event from the Plimoth Plantation officials and **Jeff Lehmann N1ZZN** had submitted the Special Event details that were published in QST magazine.

80-METER BASE STATION AT THE HORNBLOWER HOUSE

The crew set up the Club's ICOM IC-756 transceiver as an 80-Meter Base Station and connected it to the Fritzel long wire HF antenna hung between trees outside the Hornblower House. **Jeff Lehmann N1ZZN** set up one of the Club's laptop computers with the new logging program for the 80-Meter Base Station and showed the operators how to enter contact data. The 80-Meter Base Station made 28 contacts – mostly in Massachusetts with a few in New York, New Jersey, Pennsylvania, Maine and New Hampshire.

The first contact was with **Arnie Chick W1TT** in Auburn, Maine who reported that he was a Whitman Amateur Radio Club member between 1966 and 1971 before he moved out of the area. 

A trip to Plimoth Plantation is a must for one and all. The Plimoth Plantation is located about 3 miles south of the Plymouth waterfront where the Mayflower II is located. The following information was gathered from the Plimoth Plantation handouts and talks with the Pilgrim actors and Native Americans.

The outdoor living museum is an educational and historical experience where actors dress the part of Pilgrims and speak in English dialects as they portray actual residents of colonial Plymouth. It is like time travel – back in time to 1627, just 7 years after the Pilgrims first arrived. The Pilgrims live in timber framed homes with thatched roofs and are going about their daily chores.

Trees are cut and you can see the logs being made into beams. Using only an ax, the Pilgrims will knock off the sides of the trees and make it into a beam. They have saws and can saw the beam into planks. The planks were used to make siding for the houses, flooring, shelving and even the outer wall of the village.

At the Craft Center you can see the Plimoth Plantation's skilled artisans using traditional techniques and tools as they make 17th century furniture along with basket weaving, pottery, beadwork and clothing construction.

Plymouth was a farming community and you will see cows, goats, pigs, and poultry. Plimoth Plantation maintains one of the country's most important collections of rare breed farm animals.


The living collection has been gathered from around the world and includes Kerry and Milking Devon cattle, San Clemente and Arapawa Island goats, Wiltshire Horn sheep and Tamworth pigs.


Visit the Wampanoag Indian home site where Native people, dressed in traditional Native (deer skin) dress, tend their gardens, cook over open fires and demonstrate crafts using ancient techniques to build such items as a dugout canoe. The Native people have lived in southern New England for 12,000 years. Generations have shaped the land. See a Wetu (their word for house). Unlike the 1627 English Village, the Native people speak in their own modern words about the experiences of the Wampanoag

The Plimoth Plantation Special Event Operators spread the word over the airways explaining about the living museum and how they found the visitors, especially the children, amazed by the actors, dressed as Pilgrims, when they did not acknowledge the existence of any of our modern wonders such as radios, computers, telephones and TV's.


