BOSTON MARATHON COMMUNICATION By: Steve Schwarm W3EVE

Steve Schwarm W3EVE gave a presentation on Boston Marathon Communications at the Whitman Club April meeting. The following are notes taken by "**The Bruce**" **NI1X** at the meeting

Steve W3EVE reported that in all about 250 HAMs are involved in the Boston Marathon. Most are strategically positioned along the race course with 20 manning the Net Control headquarters that is located on the top floor of a 5 story building on top of a 300 foot hill in Brookline. Great antenna location.

Amateur Radio is supporting the Boston Athletics Association, MEMA, Red Cross, Boston Emergency Medical Services, Public Safety Departments of eight municipalities, runners, the press and the public. Initial traffic involves set up and supplies. Primary traffic is First Aid requests.

40 HAMs at the Start Team 20 HAMs at Net Control

22 HAMs on Busses

110 HAMs on the Course Team 60 HAMs at Finish Team

HAMs are stationed at the State Forest remote parking lot at Hopkinton as spectators and runners transition to busses to be taken to either the Start Line (spectators) or Athletic Village (runners). Divert busses where needed.

HAMs are stationed in the Athletic Village to help runners from all over the world team up with their friends and fellow runners. One HAM is positioned at the Athletic Village First Aid tent.

HAMs are assigned as shadows to follow race officials around the start line at the Hopkinton Commons and keep the officials in contact with each other as they encounter logistics problems, coordinating the staggered start of 26,000 runners. Computer chip timing allows for staggered start of Hand Cycle, Wheel chair, Elite women and men in waves 20 minutes apart.

HAMs are assigned to 48 water stations (both sides of the road) and 26 First Aid stations located every mile along the course. Expect few injuries near start and heavy use further down the course. After the start – Each First Aid station can support two (2) Away Teams that are sent out walking among the crowds of people. A HAM is assigned to each Away Team



because cell phones may not be working and HAM radio is the only way to call for an ambulance.

HAMs are positioned on 20 busses that are dispatched to pick up injured runners at the First Aid Station along the course. They report runners number and extent of injury – no names.

HAMs are positioned at the Net Control Headquarters. They are monitoring 20 frequencies that include 15 SIMPLEX and 5 REPEATERS. This presents an interesting intermod and desense problems that have to be managed. The shared antenna system is an example of innovative engineering. The ambulance dispatch (two) and State Police dispatch is also located at the Net Control Operations Center.

HAMs are positioned at the finish line in downtown Boston as shadows for a dozen race officials and at the finish line Medical Tent supporting the Red Cross. HAMs provide voluntary registration and logistical support for the medical bus communications, and support medical sweeps of the area. HAMs staff other strategic positions such as working with Boston police to help provide bus traffic control at the finish line.

BOSTON MARATHON -- REPORTS FROM THE FIELD

Jim O'Rourke WG1L reports: "I was at the Athletes Village on 2-Meters with Pi Pugh K1RV. I was with the announcer (his name is Peter) and Pi K1RV would send me messages I would pass them to the announcer and he would put them out over the P A system to the crowd of runners".

Jeremy Breef-Pilz KB1REQ reports: "2012 was my first year of officially volunteering for the Boston Marathon. I signed up for finish line operations and was assigned to the elite medical transport. We provided supervised transportation to the finish area medical complex for elite runners who dropped out of the race.

As was expected we had a busy day driving between Copley Square and various points along the course. It was shocking to see so many runners who spend so much time training for this event to be incapable of finishing. Another testament to the extreme weather was the extremely high volume of traffic on the infamous Boston Marathon Bus Net.

Communication worked well and thanks to the Waltham repeater we had coverage over the entire course. After the elite transports were suspended I filled in on Finish Area Medical Sweep which covered the area beyond the finish line with medical teams and wheelchairs to bring any runner in need of attention to the medical tents. By the time I took over most of the runners had already finished and the heat had passed so the number of calls had decreased. It was a long 5-9 day, but It was rewarding and I look forward to working the event in the future.

BOSTON MARATHON -- MORE REPORTS FROM THE FIELD

Newspaper reports temperatures in the high 80s reduced the official runners from a normal 26,000 runners to 22,000 this year. There were at least 2100 people treated in medical tents. There were reports of 215 people being taken by ambulance to area hospitals.

Jim Tynan KC1JET Reports "I was the shadow for Ron Krammer the director of the start vehicle escorts. The vehicles included the lead truck for the runners with a timer clock so that the lead runners could tell their time.

These vehicles also included the Grand Marshall's car and any other vehicle that the BAA allows.".

She was a busy woman as she moved from the info tent to the starting line and all points in between. It was great to be part of the communication support radio team.

AMATEUR RADIO EMERGENCY SERVICE (ARES) -- BRIDGEWATER COMMAND CENTER

Carl Aveni N1FY reports that he opened the ARES Regional Command Center at the Bridgewater EOC during the running of the Boston Marathon.

Carl N1FY reports that he was on standby with Richard Reuss KA1LKB, Ed Caron KA1RSY and Roy Logan KB1CYV where they were monitoring 6 channels that included the Boston REPEATER and local public Safety Police & Fire.

Carl N1FY reported that Mike Neilsen W1MPN and Rob Macedo KD1CY were at MEMA Headquarters

in Framingham. All ARES command stations were in communication through an Instant messaging AOL chat room and the EchoLink New England NETWORK node.

The Red Cross and medical personnel were prepared for the high temperatures with cooling pools and extra ice.



This race covered surface streets through the heart of Brockton. From the Brockton YMCA, the runners ran south on Montello Street to Perkins Avenue and then returned north on Main street, crossing about 20 side streets along the 3 mile course. COMMEMORATES THE SINKING OF THE TITANIC 100 YEARS AGO

The Chatham Marconi Maritime Museum, in conjunction with **Barbara Dugan N1NS** of the Cape Cod National Seashore, and the Falmouth Amateur Radio Association, operated a Special Event Station to commemorate the 100th anniversary of the sinking of the Titanic and staffed exhibits at the Chatham Marconi Maritime Center in Chatham, MA. that was open for the public to see.

Over 40 area HAMs volunteered to help keep the Special Event Station **KM1CC** "On-The-Air" from April 12th thru April 15th. Representing the Whitman Amateur Radio Club, as Special Event
