PRESIDENT'S MESSAGE:

Greetings,

This is Jim W1JT.

Attracting new people of all ages to our hobby is one of the most important things we can pursue both as a club and as individuals. Amateur Radio offers many diverse interests that people can focus on, and I think that that is what causes so many people of different backgrounds and interests to turn their attention to Ham Radio.

Every new person that we help join our hobby is a very valuable resource who increases the strength, versatility and value of our organization. Each new person who is encouraged to join our group has the potential to help the growth of Amateur Radio and to help lead our club into the future.

I have been hearing about the decline of Amateur Radio and what I have been hearing is often reinforced when people say to me "Ham Radio....Do People Still Do That"?

So, I decided to do some research to try to determine the rate of decline that the hobby is experiencing.

What I found was a surprise to me. A pleasant surprise for sure but a surprise none the less.

When I visited the ARRL website I read the following:

AMATEUR RADIO SHOWING STEADY GROWTH IN THE US

The Amateur Radio population in the US has continued to show steady growth. As of the end of 2013, the FCC database showed 717,201 licenses in its Universal Licensing System (ULS). That's the greatest number of US hams ever and up from 709,575 in December 2012. The volume of Amateur Radio applications slowed somewhat to 141,943 from its zenith of 176,826 in 2007, the year the FCC dropped the Morse code requirement.

"The three current license classes also peaked at the end of 2013," notes ARRL VEC Manager Maria Somma, AB1FM. "FCC-issued club station licenses are also at an all-time high in the FCC database at 11,363. The number of new licensees has increased by 7 percent over last year (28,886 in 2013 and 27,082 in 2012)." Somma said that a significant number of Technician licensees were earned

through large emergency communication and Community Emergency Response Team (CERT) classes.

The breakdown by license class shows Technicians as the largest group, at 349,163 licensees, followed by General licensees at 167, 257, Amateur Extra licensees at 133,391, and Advanced licensees at 54,293. Technician numbers have grown by 8.2 percent over the past decade, with an impressive comeback since 2007 after the population had plummeted from a peak of 338,334 in March 2000. The General class population has risen by slightly more than 18 percent over the past 10 years. But the Amateur Extra class has shown the most remarkable growth over the past decade, climbing by slightly more than 27 percent, with no dramatic spike after the Morse requirement went away.

Wow! That's great news! People are really interested in our amazing hobby!

Each of us as members of one of the more active clubs in our area has a golden opportunity to share our exciting story with the people who cross our paths every day.

I for one am going to increase my efforts to talk about Amateur Radio with everyone I meet.

I challenge each of you to do the same.

Thank you for taking the time to read this message, I'll see you all at the meeting!

- The December QST should provide overall ARRL Field Day contesting totals.
- Jim W1JT reports hand written logs were transposed into N1MM computer logs in order to calculate the overall contest totals. This was time consuming and difficult. He feels better laptops and additional computer log training prior to next years Field Day will help the situation and allow us improve. A campaign to have better laptops is now happening. Jim also suggests we investigate mesh networking so all field laptops can communicate w/each other.

MARSHFIELD FAIR Update:

- **Bill N1FRE** reports he has tickets (including parking) to the Fair. These are for volunteers signing up for time slots at the club booth. At this time his tickets are for ham volunteers only (family tickets may come later). Bill circulated the paper sign up sheet and asked all who wish to sign up to please do so tonight.
- Tickets will be available from **Bill N1FRE**, **Jim W1JT and Paul KB1MTW** after the meeting and throughout the operation at the Fair (supplies last).
- Mark KC1ACF reports 3 anteanns have been tested at his home: the Windom, the R5 and the 2M beam (for contact w/the Whitman club repeater). Bill N1FRE has tested the club coax (50' and 100' runs). Jim KB1PFL also helped at the clubhouse w/the anteanns and coax.
- Jeff N1ZZN comments that we typically have a 2M verticle antenna as well. This can be used to contact other area repeaters and also support an APRS station. Paul KB1MTW will look into this (verticle antenna is at the club house).
- A show of hands voted for 2 HF stations be setup at the Fair.

- **Mark KC1ACF** suggests we face the radios at the booth towards the public rather than back towards the booth itself. This would allow the public a better experience during a demonstation.
- **Paul KB1MTW** suggests local simplex use for demo purposes and also arranging some dates/times with **Chin 9M2CW** (in West Malaysia) for checkins via EchoLink. **Mike W1MSP** will mention this to Chin.
- **Bill W1ACO** questioned the antenna use in the vacinity of the Birds of Prey exibit. **Paul KB1MTW** explained the Windom antenna is the only risk to the birds and safety tape has been added to mitigate the issue.
- Judy KB1SRO asked if contact w/other area repeaters (such as the Plymouth repeater) is allowed. Jim W1JT felt this was ok. Although not taken to a vote, there were no objections from the membership. Judy also offered to add a item to the Genesis clubs web site w/the Fair details.
- **Mark KC1AFC** suggests we adhere as close as possible to the published special event station frequencies. **Jeff N1ZZN** reports these frequencies will be in the September QST : 3860,7260 (not if PA system is affected),14.260,18.160
- Dave KB1QMX suggests several local newspapers (ex: <u>Whitman-Hanson</u> <u>Express</u>) can be used to bring this event to the general public. Mark KC1ACF has agreed to work press release details for the club.
- **Bill N1FRE** will create flyers for the September 13/14 Whitman club Flea Market and make available at the Fair booth.
- **Jim W1JT** confirms the antenna raising party is on Thursday before the Fair starting at 10am.
- Gary W1GRC confirms use of the .775 and .390 repeaters at the Fair is ok.
- Jeff N1SOM will be dropping of a small fridge. Bill N1FRE will purchase a case of bottled water. Jeff N1SOM will be printing out certificates and QSL cards.

General business:

- **Ross W1EKG** suggests (based on a recent converstion on the Wednesday 28.333Mhz, 8PM net: Business cards (aka Eyeball QSO cards) be made which represent the Whitman Amateur Radio Club containing contact details, repeater details and monthly club meeting details. These could be given out at the Marshfield Fair and all club events to follow. Ross also suggests each member have a few w/them which can be given out to anyone we meet who is interested in ham radio and the Whitman club.
 - A general discussion on how to get these created took place and what quantity to order. Ross estimates 1000 cards will cost about \$40. Our club logo is on file at a local print shop. Jeff N1SOM will contact the print shop regarding ordering details
 - Motion made to purchase 1000 Whitman club busness/eyeball QSO cards made by Ross W1EKG with a second by Jeff WK1D. Motion passed quorum vote.
 - (Ed note: since the August meeting, the Whitman club business cards have been created. Sample/proof provided here):



- **Dave KB1QMX** suggests and online storage repository for items like this. A general discussion takes place and its felt this is a good idea but should be restricted from general public access.
- Charlie W1CBR is planning to hold a technician training class starting September 16th, location tbd, which should run through October. (4) new (Gordon West) training books and (1) CD will be needed as the FCC just changed the technician question pool. Jeff N1SOM has the ordering details (approx \$150). Motion to allocate funds to order the new training material made by Jeff N1ZZN, followed by a second from Jeff WK1D. Motion passed quorum vote.
- **Paul KB1MTW** tells us a new/improved repeater is now on the air: **W1SSH**: 147.345 +, 110.9. This is supporting both analog and the new Yeasu Digital Fusion mode.
- Paull KB1MTW reminded us a few road races coming up and volunteers are needed:

 - <u>3rd Annual Miles with the Mayor 5K Road Race</u>. It will be held on Sunday, September 21, 2014 and will start at 10 am. (to volunteer contact Greg Glynn at w1vfb@verizon.net)
